
- IN THE SPOTLIGHT -

On Thursday, June 28, our annual program on Americanism will have three special features you will not want to miss.

Colonel Robert Browning (U.S. Marine Corps retired), our own Pat Browning's husband, will join us to discuss his experiences in the Middle East and his more recent service to support our men and women in the military.

Bob started and runs First Presbyterian Church's Mili-



tary Ministry, and you will be amazed to learn what he has accomplished for our military personnel and what could be done at your own church or by other organizations.

Bob is a native of Florida and received his college degree from Florida State University. After joining the Marine Corps, he served two tours in Vietnam. Subsequently, he served in the United Kingdom and in Bahrain, a vital part of the Middle East. He also served in the Pentagon. After his retirement, Bob worked in the aeronautics industry, and he now has his own international consulting firm. We are fortunate to have Bob join us between his international work and travel.

In addition to Bob Browning, we will also feature another Marine veteran at our June 28 meeting. Al Bergman and his band will entertain us with patriotic music. Al was raised in a musical family, and he successfully followed in the family tradition. His uncle, Dewey Bergman, played with Guy Lombardo for more than 30 years. Following his service as a Marine, Al played with Charlie Spivak, and he still plays at Furman University, for his church, the American Legion, the Shriners and at various other places and occasions around Greenville.

In addition to Bob and Al, we will also have a pre-

sentation that describes the purpose and success of the Fisher Houses, which are located at more than 30 military hospitals today. These facilities house military personnel, active and retired, and their families, in a home setting when they are undergoing medical treatment. Without these homes away from home, many military families would be unable to spend this important time with their veteran because of the expenses it would entail. This is a service deserving of support, and as part of our Caring for America program, we will provide envelopes for those who would like to contribute.

Brit proud to be Republican

I have been blessed with the opportunity to be a proud Republican for many years now.

My interest in politics and the Republican Party has been shaped by a process that began during the 1976 Presidential election when my sixth grade class took part and followed the campaign and the election. I vividly remember being only one of a handful of students that campaigned for and supported President Gerald Ford.

At this time, my mother and I were still resident legal aliens from Great Britain. My father had already become a United States citizen, and my sister had been born in the United States. As national events continued to unfold over the next three years, my mother decided that it was definitely time for us to apply for United States citizenship. This detailed process began in 1979, and five additional years would pass before we would get to take the oath of citizenship.

With great delight at Ronald Reagan winning the presidency in 1980, I found myself following political events in the newspaper and television as much as possible. Then in 1982, as a high school senior, my Government teacher gave us all a great assignment. That assignment was to write a formal letter to the President. I sat down and wrote a letter of encouragement to President Reagan.

Much to my surprise, my other classmates started quickly receiving form letters of acknowledgement, but I did not receive one. I will admit that I was quite disappointed. However, on a cold Sunday afternoon in February 1983, our postmaster came driving up. He delivered a large brown box with all kinds of official stamps and stickers. The postmaster brought it personally because he thought we were in some kind of trouble with the FBI. Nothing could have been further from the truth.

Inside this box was a beautiful package with a book about the White House, post cards and a letter addressed to me from President Reagan. I was in complete shock to think that the leader of the Free World took the time to write to me. Well, needless to say, I was now hooked for life as a Republican.

Luckily, several months later, my mother and I received word that processing of our citizenship would begin. In early 1984, after a trip to Charleston for an oral FBI interview, my mother and I took the oath of citizenship on June 15, 1984. I will never forget the importance of this day as long as I live. Shortly thereafter, my mother and I registered to vote. It was extremely important to both of us that we vote to help re-elect President Reagan.

Since 1984, I have taken the opportunity to vote seriously. I have done my best to stay on top of issues and events as well as support local and national Republican candidates. However, I have always wanted to take a more active role in the political process. This desire became extremely intense after the outcome of the 2006 mid-term election and the monumental importance of the coming Presidential election for our great nation. Luckily, a dear co-worker, Frankie White, introduced me to Betty Poe, and as they say, "the rest is history." I consider being given the opportunity to be an active member of the Greenville County Republican Women's Club a dream come true as well as a sincere honor and privilege. *Fiona J. Davidson.*
