The state mandates that every 10 years an update be made in the land use plan for all South Carolina counties.

So, because this is gearing up to be a hot topic for the community and county council as well, we have asked the **Greenville County Planning Department** to give a presentation about the proposed **Future Land Use Map** for the entire county.

The map is a culmination of a 16-month effort known as Imagine Greenville County. The map will illustrate the vision for future development for the next 10 years.

The mission of the Greenville County Planning Department is to promote managed growth in Greenville County by maintaining a comprehensive planning program that

minimizes land-use conflicts, coordinates the provision of public services and optimizes the quality of life for all county residents.

The future of our county depends on proper planning that encourages and controls growth in a positive manner

According to the Comprehensive Plan Draft from May 2009: "Stretching from the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains into the Piedmont region of South Carolina, Greenville County provides an ideal location and quality of life that are surpassed only by its matchless beauty.

"From humble beginnings as a Cherokee trading outpost to the consolidation of the Greenville District in 1786, the area that is today Greenville County has flourished as an important regional center and an area of national and global prominence. As home to over 430,000 residents, Greenville County remains South Carolina's

largest county by population and the 13th largest county by land area at approximately 790 square miles.

"Greenville County is also the fastest growing county within the 10 county Upstate Region, with an average annual growth rate of 1.93 percent."

Legislative Corner: Battle of the Budget

Gov. Mark Sanford received the budget from the General Assembly and returned his vetoes to the General Assembly for review by midnight May 19.



The House and Senate have five days from the receipt of the budget

to either override or sustain the Governor's vetoes. For three months, the Governor has been arguing that the state should not incorporate \$350 million of stabilization funds into the budget unless a corresponding amount of debt is paid off.

Let me highlight a couple of points about the General Assembly's budget that you may find interesting.

- The General Assembly's budget incorporates more than \$1 billion of stimulus money. This \$1 billion has kept the General Assembly from making necessary reforms to government structure. For six years, Gov. Sanford has been pushing to continue the restructuring and consolidation efforts that Gov. Carroll Campbell started, but these stimulus funds have allowed the General Assembly to avoid making tough choices.
- The annualizations in the budget passed by the General Assembly total \$920 million over two years. This means in two years, when all of the windfall dollars have stopped flowing from Washington, the state will have a \$920 million hole in its budget.

It is time that our General Assembly learns how to make tough choices. We elect these men and women to represent us, and we expect them to make tough choices for the future. We have some great members of the General Assembly but they all need to hear from you. I ask you to call your Senator and House member and tell them to support the Governor's vetoes. We have to hold our elected representatives accountable. Their votes belong to us, and I encourage you to make your voice heard! *Jamie Bach*.
